Do you know about the health portfolio provided by 23andMe? The Food and Drug Administration approved 23andMe's report on consumers' risks for developing colorectal cancer. In 2017 approval was given for predisposition for Parkinson's, Alzheimer's and in 2018 breast cancer risk. The most recent addition is a customer's percent chance of developing Type 2 diabetes.

While 23andMe has said these reports are meant to empower consumers and help them control and improve their health as much as possible, experts have cautioned customers against relying on them for make health decisions, given the complicated equation of determining chronic disease risk.

Customers should take any health-related prognostication information to a medical provider that they trust.

One hardly has to leave their favorite chair to check on old obituaries, marriages or family reunions. A situation came up recently where the WPA Records listed a gentleman who died in 1923 as being buried in the Atlantic Cemetery. The Atlantic Cemetery has no records of this person. Checking his obituary I found he was taken overland after the funeral services to be buried in the Avoca Cemetery.

## MARY CONTINUES THE STORY-FROM MONTANA TO MASSENA

Cindy Sievers presented our February program using information from the diary of George Irons' Family journey down the Missouri River in 1895 from Great Falls MT to Massena IA. This information was given by Kenneth Irons who was a grandson of George Irons and his third wife. George Irons, his wife Mary Hall Irons and their two daughters Myrtle Hallie and Jessie Agatha made the trip in four months and seven days. It was a distance just over 3.000 river miles as the river ran in 1895. George was a brother of William E. Irons, who was Editor of the Massena paper from 1892-1897. Mr. Irons changed the name of the paper to "The Echo." George Irons' wife divorced him upon their arrival in Massena. Mary then ran the hotel in Massena called the Buckley Hotel. Mary Hall Irons was born 1861 and died in 1909. She is buried in the Massena Center Cemetery.

Myrtle Hallie Irons born 1888 in Nebraska and died 1914 is buried in the Massena Center Cemetery. Myrtle married Arthur Pigg of Massena. They had one son Ronald O. Pigg born

13 September 1911. Atlantic News Telegraph 7-30-1945 head line reads: FORMER MASSENAN LOST IN SINKING OF PRISON SHIP, Capt. Pigg. age 33, died last December when a Japanese ship carrying American prisoners of war from the Philippines to Japan was sunk by American forces near the Philippines. He graduated from the school of engineering at Iowa State College. Capt. Pigg was employed as an engineer in building Corregidor fortifications and was taken prisoner by invading Japanese forces in 1941. He continued to work in a Jap labor battalion. after being captured. Findagrave.com shows his death as January 28, 1945 with burial listed Manila American Cemetery and Memorial. Manila Philippines. A.R. Pigg of Massena applied for a stone or marker for an unmarked grave. A flat Bronze Marker with a Latin Cross was ordered and placed at the Massena Center Cemetery in memory of Capt. Ronald Orville Pigg whose body was never recovered.
