SIGN IS ATTRACTIVE

NEW LOCATION


Perhaps you have heard that the Library has scheduled some renovation. It won't happen until later this year probably beginning after Labor Day.

On Easter Sunday, April 17, 1911 and just before the benediction was read at the Church of Christ Greta Disbrow and George Daniels surprised the congregation by coming before the altar and being married by Rev. Mack. Following the ceremony and benediction the surprised congregation expressed good wishes to the newly wed couple. The Daniels had three children, Katherine who died in infancy and George and Gerald.
