Family History Found in Quilt

The Iowa Quilt Research Project documented quilts in Iowa made between 1800 and 1940. When a quilt was brought to a registration site, it was given an identifying number and a label to be sewn onto the quilt.

I purchased one of those quilts and contacted the Iowa Historical Society to ask for the history. Whoever registered this quilt provided quite a lot of background information. Turns out the quilt maker has a link to a familiar name in Walnut.

The quilt was registered in Atlantic on August 25, 1988. Perhaps it was brought to the site by a granddaughter.

The quilt is a nine-patch design made between 1875 and 1900 by Lovisa Ranney Brand. She pieced a quilt top for each of her grandchildren. The quilt owner's mother and sister, Myrtle and Arlene Lehman, quilted the top in 1938.

Lovisa was born August 21, 1831 in Oneida County New York. She died on December 25, 1919 in Warren County Iowa. Her parents were Eli Ranney and Evalina Parmalee Ranney.

Note from Mary

While sorting through our research material and trying to find a home for each book, I uncovered some books we have inherited from the Cass County Clerks Office. Among them are record books for liquor permits for druggist, doctors' and clergy. They could not buy malt liquor. Also, a book for registration of certificates for optometrist, physicians and midwives. There was a filing fee of \$.50. What I found most interesting was two books titled Notice to Paupers Record. Here is an example of such a form for a Mrs. Anderson who was served with the notice in 1897. There were also postings in the newspaper under County Business. It was the sheriff's duty to serve the notice.

We don't know the story of Mrs. Anderson.
Obviously, she came from a different county.
We don't know why she left her former home.
No husband was asked to leave so we must think she is a widow. Something brought her here. Did she have no family to seek help from?
Some of the people who are asked to leave the county were whole families. One family was

asked to leave in 1946. Had that husband/father been wounded in the war? Maybe there wasn't a job for him to come back to! This book is a research tool I have never thought to use. Do I have a "lost relative" that has seemed to have just disappear off the face of the earth? Perhaps checking to see if other counties/states have this same record book might be helpful.

Top left picture is of Grant School which was located at 207 Cedar St. from 1890 to 1974 when the building was torn down to make room for a playground. Kindergarten through 3rd grades were held here until 1963.

Lower left is a map of lowa from around 1856. The railroad had only made it to lowa City at this time.

Top middle is a Cass County memorial plate celebrating the Bicentennial 1776-1976. **Lower middle** is a certificate presented to CCGS as a chapter member of Iowa Genealogical Society dated 1982.

Upper right is the Rev. George Hitchcock House near Lewis which was a station on the Underground Railroad.

Lower right is a map of Cass County Country Schools dated 1902. It shows the location and names of each country school in each township. We do have some information on some of the country schools. We also have some information on country schools written by Bob Anderson and Jennifer Hart.
