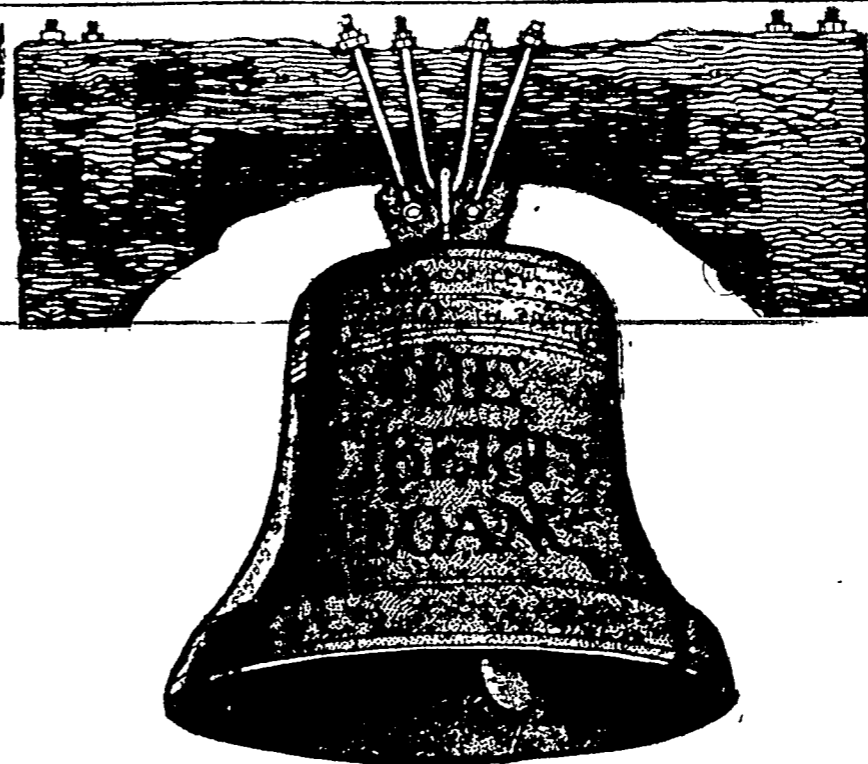

MAKES DONATION OF \$10,000 FOR REDCROSS WORK

GEORGE W. DULANY COMPANY CONTRIBUTES \$10,000.

TO RAISE \$50,000 IN COUNTY

Donations for Local Activities to Date
 Total \$1,775—Committee Meets.

Ten thousand dollars has been subscribed by the George W. Dulany Company to form the nucleus of Clinton county's \$50,000 to be raised during Red Cross Week, June 18th to 26th, when the national association hopes to raise one hundred million dollars. This announcement was made Monday evening at a meeting of the local chapter at the Lafayette hotel. Chairman F. J. Iton presided for the first time Monday night, and there was a full representation of the executive committee in attendance.

A report was submitted by W. W. Cook, chairman of the membership committee, announcing the following donations:

Five members of the local chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution whose names are withheld, \$1,000.

Total donations to date, \$1,775.

This fund is to be used in local Red Cross activities, principally in preparing hospital supplies. Mr. Iton in a few days will announce a membership committee to make a drive in the city for new members. There are now 750 members in the Clinton county chapter, 500 of whom are in the city of Clinton. This is not a large membership for a county as populous as Clinton, but the local chapter has done more than the average Iowa chapter in supply work, and preparing hospital supplies. The local members are patriotic and enthusiastic, and the usefulness of the Clinton county chapter will increase from week to week as more funds become available, and its membership grows. With America at war, and prospects for a long campaign ahead of the American soldiers, the people of the nation are rapidly awakening to the need of the Red Cross and to the important place the society fills in the general war preparations. Splendid subscriptions recently received by the local chapter show that the people of Clinton are alive to the worthiness of the cause, and to the imperative necessity of supplying the county chapter with funds to carry on the great work it has undertaken.

Chairman Iton soon will announce a committee to take charge of arrangements for Red Cross Week in Clinton county.

FULTON RATE TO CHICAGO RAISED TO \$3.26 NOW

BUSINESS AT CLINTON STATION SHOWS INCREASE.

NO SAVING IN ILLINOIS

Many Travelers Heretofore Purchased Tickets from Here to Sterling and Would Rebuy There.

The railroad fare over the North-Western between Chicago and Fulton has been raised from \$2.72 to \$3.26 effective yesterday. As a result the ticket agent, Walter Reusche, at the Clinton passenger station, finds his ticket sales increasing considerably.

Many travelers, commercial men especially, have been in the habit of buying a ticket from Clinton to Sterling and then rebuying from Sterling to Chicago in order to effect a saving under Illinois' two-cent fare. Sterling was used as a rebuying station chiefly because it was the first important stop between this city and the Great Lakes metropolis.

Mississippi river cities outside of the state of Illinois, headed by St. Louis, have been waging a vigorous fight on

the Illinois two-cent a mile rate, finding themselves at a serious disadvantage, as the interstate rate is 2.4 cents. For example it would cost \$3.56 between Clinton and Chicago, and only \$2.72 between Fulton and Chicago a difference of 84 cents. Hence it was cheaper to buy a ticket from Clinton to Fulton and buy another ticket at Fulton, than it would be to buy a through ticket.

It was not an uncommon thing for a traveling man to stop up to the ticket window here and ask for information about eastern connections at Chicago, or about train service to Chicago, and then throw the money on the window counter for a ticket to Sterling, as the through trains running via the cut-off do not pass through Fulton.

Now all this is changed, and it is no longer possible to make a saving under the Illinois rate as compared with the interstate fare. The Illinois commission, however, has announced that it will disregard the action of the interstate commerce body and attempt an enforcement of the flat two-cent rate.
