using newspapers for research by LaVerne Velau

The following is a brief summary of the talk given by Mr. Velau from Klemme, Iowa, at our May Workshop. Mr. Velau is a volunteer field investigator for the Iowa Newspaper Project. His talk was very informative for all the people that were able to attend the workshop.

Items found in newspapers:

- 1. List of unclaimed letters—from time to time one finds in old newspapers, a list of names furnished by the local post office, of letters that have not been picked up. This is sometimes a clue as to about what time period an ancestor was in an area.
- 2. Notice of non-payment of debts. This could give you a feel of the time by the length of the list or of your ancestor's ability to pay his debts.
- 3. Homestead notices—the person applying for homestead status was required to place a notice in the newspaper. It had to include the description of the land, patient number or application number and the person had to have no outstanding debts.
- 4. Notice of transfer of property—usually personal property. Now this just applies to real estate.
- 5. Delinquent tax list.
- 6. Marriage notices--sometimes printed two or three weeks after wedding. Sometimes only notice will be in local news columns from neighborhood in an area. Marriages before 1890's were usually in December and January.
- 7. Obituaries:
 - a. For female ancestors usually not very much information, if any at all. Usually more information on males. Again checking local item columns may be the best chance of getting any information.
 - b. Check newspaper up to four or five weeks after actual death date.
 - c. If death was during an election time, information will be scarce.
- 8. Party Announcements:
 - a. Birthday parties--may list birth place, neighbors and family names.
 - b. Anniversary notices -- may give names, dates, place and parents names of the couple. Sometimes very informative,
- 9. Lists of baptisms -- church affiliation and age possible with this. Births.
- 10. Divorces.
- 11. Adoptions.
- 12. Naturalization papers.
- 13. Family Reunions--lists family names and sometimes addresses.

When doing research with newspapers, a careful check of papers in surrounding areas is necessary. Sometimes larger community newspapers carry information for smaller areas.

Mr. Velau spoke briefly on where to find newspaper collections. He listed these places in Iowa and surrounding states—Iowa City; *State Historical Museum, Madison, Wisconsin; Wisconsin State Archives, and Minnesota State Historical Archives. collections can be inter-library loaned. Other places to check are court-houses, especially for years 1860's, 1880's, local historical society, local libraries and newspaper offices. Mr. Velau felt that using public collections of newspapers should be the researchers first choice. Private collections and newspaper office collections are not always staffed for researchers.

Sometimes the condition of the paper is a major reason why researchers are not allowed to use bound volumes of newspapers. Newspapers printed in the 1850's to 1877 were on good paper and have held up well over the years. After 1877 papers were made of more pulp and acid. The ink used during that time was improved. Today's newsprint has about 10-15 year length quality. If stored in a dry, dark place, the length of time the newsprint will last and stay readable is considerable longer.

Microfilm of newspapers is a good way to do newspaper research when the actual paper is not available. Be sure and check with your public libraries for details on how to send for the microfilm. -- Sue Spilman.

Roy C. Roba Icwa Genealogical, Society The social, cultural, ethnic, and econimic development of every village, city, and state in our nation is chronicled in newspapers. Unfortunately, our newspapers are often the victims of damage from fire, flood, vandalism, and unfavorable storage conditions; and all too often, knowledge of a newspaper's existence is merely passed on from one person to another. Today there is a growing concern among journalists, historians, publishers, archivists, librarians, genealogists, and other citizens for ensuring the preservation of and access to United States newspapers. The United States Newspaper Project is a response to that concern.

The Iowa Newspaper Project is part of this nationwide newspaper program and is supported in part by the National Endowment for the Humanities. Iowa's part in the U.S. Newspaper Project is unique in that it was the site of a pilot project which produced A Bibliography of Iowa Newspapers, 1836-1976. Based on this beginning, the Iowa Newspaper Project is a more extensive and intensive project designed to locate, catalog, and microfilm all existing issues of the state's newspapers, both past and present.

WHY DO THIS?

-While nearly all newspapers published in Iowa have been identified, physical copies of all of them have not been located. This project will locate all that still exist and add the bibliographic information to the already partly-compiled data base.

-Newspapers will be preserved for research. They are a source of a great deal of historical information about both local and national matters. They tell of local people and events which are recorded in no other source. Disintregrating newspapers and the valuable information they contain will be lost if copies are not identified and microfilmed.

-This project will add information about Iowa's newspapers to a national computer data base, making them more easily available for use in research.

THE PROJECT IS DIVIDED INTO THESE PHASES:

Phase I The planning phase.

Phase II Locating and cataloging Iowa's newspapers

Phase III A massive campaign to preserve these newspapers on microfilm. (See next page for details.)


Concern For An Endangered Resource continued ---

The planning phase, funded by NEH and the Iowa State Historical Department, was completed in May. The Project staff has done most of the groundwork necessary for the successful launching of Phase II. The cataloging phase involves sending specially-trained catalogers to over 700 sites scattered throughout Iowa in order to accurately record the necessary bibliographic information, a task which is often made difficult by numerous changes in title, frequency of publication, place of publication, and so on (a catalogers nightmare).

There will be two cataloging centers: one in Ames and one in Iowa City. The Iowa State University Library in Ames will be the cataloging center for the western part of the state; the Iowa State Historical Department's Library in Iowa City will be the cataloging Center for the eastern half. The Historical Department's Des Moines office, as one of the two major repositories of of Iowa newspapers, will be providing support staff for the Project. The University of Iowa in Iowa City will be providing additional staff in the form of interns in public relations and in library science.

We will be cataloging on a county-by-county basis, starting with Johnson and Story counties, beginning in December 1984. At the same time, we will be conducting a search for newspapers that we know have been published but were not located during the 1976 Pilot Project. We need the help of local groups to assist us in our search. To make things easier, the Iowa Newspaper Project has compiled computerized lists of these missing newspapers, with access by either city or county. You may obtain a list of the newspapers in your area by writing to the Project, or from this newsletter.

Although NEH and the Project's participating institutions in Iowa will provide close to \$350,000 to this project in the form of cash, staff time, and computer time, the Project will need to raise \$25,000 - \$30,000 locally for the catalogers' transportation expenses to the various newspaper sites. The following is a map showing the estimated cost for cataloging the newspapers in each of the counties.

The next issue will contain original land entries for another township.

The History of Davis County, Iowa, 1882, gives the war record of Davis County, Iowa, starting on page 514 and continuing through page 566. It starts with April 12, 1861 and covers the Civil War period, also gives names of men serving.
