
Dear Friends & Readers

- 1. <u>The Researcher</u>—This person loves to research and will go at any time and anywhere to find anything. However, none of the discovered items ever gets compiled.
- 2. <u>The Chart Maker</u>—This person loves to make charts and family group sheets. All time is spent on this and never any references made to where the information was obtained.

HARRIET JANE VEATCH DIARY 1859 DAVIS COUNTY IOWA

I for the first time in my life take my pen to commence writing a daily journal though I am young I will endeavor to write my feelings as nearly as possible. I am not quite 16 years of age lacking about a month, this is a happy new years day to me, this past week has been vacation weeks and I am free from School. I do not enjoy very good health but I attend school regularly although I have to go 1 mile but it is good exercis.

1859

- Feb 15 It is five years to day since Christ washed my sins away and set my spirit free for which I should praise his holy name.
- Feb 17 Mother is very sick so that I have to stop going to school
- Aug 26 This is the day that our campmeeting begins although Father has a large family number 8 children we are a going to camp.
- Sep 1 Campmeeting is over and we are at home had a very good meeting. To day my Mother and sweet little sister are both very sick and I have to bed farewell to Uncle Elijah Veatchs family tis hard to part with friends.
- Sep 11 Mother is still sick and very low this morning my little sister Louisa closed her eyes in death oh tis hard to give her up it seems as if my heart would break. Lonely my mother is better but our house looks

- Feb 1 First day of the month which is Wednesday beautiful day I am still going to school I feel somewhat rude and mischievous 2 day, My Mothers birthday. She is 34 years old to day, a pleasant day.
- Feb 12 Sabbath pleasant day some snow and Ice on the ground A solemn day, I go to see a little cousin (aged 2 weeks) deposited in the tombs sweet infant gone to rest well may the poet say Tis sweet in childhood to give back the spirit to its maker.
- Feb 17 Friday I go to another burial one more little lamb (aged 10 months) gone to rest
- Feb 18 A pleasant day, today my Father is 41 years of age, old age is creeping on and his head is silvering oer with the frosts of many winters while I am yet young and in the slippery path of youth.
- Mar 2 Beautiful spring morning I feel better today attend the funeral and burials of Mrs. Bell aged 42 years, how soon we will go the ways of all the earth.
- Mar 5 Monday to day I am 17 years of age. It is a beautiful day sun shining brightly 16 springs I have seen come and close how many more I shall see no one knows.
- Mar 10 Pleasant day almost like summer. I spend to day very pleasantly attend singing school in the evening our cousins visit us. Roland and Pernelia and Tom and children. It has been some month since we saw them and they are very welcome visitors.
- Mar 18 Sabbath I have poor health to day. My eye is very painful I am obliged to stay at home awhile my parents and sisters go to church, in the evening my Uncle Josiah Roberson comes to see us he's a welcome visitor at any time.
- Mar 31 The last day of the month I go to Monterey to see about getting a school. I get the school and am to enter upon my new occupation next Monday the second day of April
- Apr 7 Am teaching school to day have been for the last four days. I find it somewhat tedious but I like my occupation very well. I go home in the evening
- May 4 I feel somewhat solemn to day if my little sister had a lived she would have been 4 years old to day but she dwells where tome is not reckoned and age is not known.
- Jun 27 Wednesday to day my school is closed after a tedious period of 3 months. I have considerable sport to day there were about 34 scholars there tomorrow I am to return home.
- Jul 1 Sabbath sweet day of rest attend s school in the monring at the new church, afterward attend the preaching of Ford preaches the funeral sermon of 3 little children so adieu.
- Jul 26 Thursday receive a visit from Rev G Burgess his borther and son Clifford. I feel somewhat abbashed at being so surprised but it is washing day.
- Aug 16 To day Mr Samuel Huston baby died very suddenly. My parents are there this evening.
- Aug 19 To day is the Sabbath. I go to meeting hear Mr Ford preach twice, at night go to the Wisegon school house to meeting have a good meeting my cousin gets converted namely William A Willis.

Aug 20 Go to meeting again to night a very warm meeting Francis Veatch is converted to night.

Aug 24 To day we re compmeeting. The meeting has begun we do not know how it will end. Uncle Elijahs family arrives here we have a time of rejoicing they have been gone from here nearly 1 year.

Sep 5 Wednesday this morning Uncle Elizahs family start for their home in Illinois and we again must take the parting hard perhaps forever.

Sep 6 This morning Pa and Mother and all my sisters except Mary went with them and my brother John to see Grandpa distant 30 miles to be gone 5 days and we will have a lonely time.

Sep 14 Morning I feel somewhat calm. I was troubled with much in my sleep last night and feel wearied this morning, my dreams of the last night trouble me, before I want to sleep I heard a strange voice it seemed calling my name. I thought it was Pa I raised up and asked what he wanted but he was asleep and made no answer. I laid me down again. Another time Harriet was spoken aloud twice. I dreamed in the night that the messenger of death came to bear my spirit away. At first it seemed that I did not wish to go and I awoke. A second time I dreamed nearly the same. I felt glad I was so soon to depart. I thought I told the family I was going to die they soon called in others but they found me deceased but I felt that the chords of life were sounding. I seemed mounted on Eagles wings there was so much joy in my soul I thought I commenced giving those near me presents of books. And they awoke almost appalled with fright at the thought of being called to soon but I want to live so that when death comes I may hail it as joyfully as I dreamed that I did. I truly feel that I desire to be wholy devoted to the Lord and do his will in all things. Sep 16 Sabbath we attend Drekevill campmeeting. Hear a very good sermon in the forenoon preached by Mr. Ford preached by Mr Hardy of Bloomfield Station at evening Mr Hare the elder preaches at night Mr Ford preaches.

Sep 18 A solemn day to me. Last night Wm Don Carlesses died and I attend his burial this afternoon. He died a triumphant death.

Nov 17 I once more take my pen after a delay of most three weeks in the time I have waded through deep afflictions. On the 28 day of October my sister Mary was taken sick and her decease seemed to grow worse instead of better on Sabbath after she took sick. Mother remained at home with Mary. Mr William Don Carlesses funeral sermon was preached. Mary grew worse until the 7th of November when she seemed to be in the agonies of death most all day but got easier in the evening. Inflammation then seized the brain. She was somewhat delirious at times. The doctor checked the inflammation on the brain it then seized on the stomach and bowels. The low typhus fever then set in. It lingered then only about 46 hours and on Friday the 16th of November at 19 minutes past two oclock she closed her eyes on death. Some three hours before she died (being speechless) she gave us her hand to bid us all adieu and then pointed upward as a sign that she was going, her hand then fell at her side she was in the dread agonies of death for about two long hours. Though her death was hard yet we have the assurance that she died triumphantly. Bro Hayes is to preach her funeral this evening. I truly feel weighed down with grief.

Dec 12 Wednesday I get up early did up the morning work partly and then went to school for the first that I have went this term. I did not get my lessons very well. Studying grammer, arithmetic and astronomy.

Dec 24 Monday Got up early this morning, very cold we go to washing about eight oclock it began to snow and it had snowed all day and is snowing yet tonight. The snow is about 1 foot deep. This evening I feel so very lonely. This time last year my sister Mary was here with me but tonight I am here alone while she sleeps in Bethel Churchyard under the snow. Oh dear dear Mary how can I give you up, give you up, how can I bear the idea of being separated from you, I do not feel like I can enjoy the Christmas holidays this winter while two of my sweet sisters lie deep buried in the ground the snow doth beat over the silver resting place of departed ones tonight. But tis Christmas eve and eight oclock. Mr Hyter the school teacher is here but yet I am lonely for Mary is not here her sparkling eyes are not in the family circle to night, but we have parted to meet again so I must retire. Good bye to all Dec 25 Tuesday Get up this morning everything looks bright and shining the ground is covered with snow and the crystals filters in the sunshine. We as a family consult awhile how we shall spend this Christmas, we have generally staid at home on Christmas occasions and have had company. We consult over it a little and at last concluded to go to Mr Barnes distant 4 miles and spend the day. We started about 10 oclock had such a nice ride in Pa's sled all the family went except Edward and Anderson they preferred going to school. We arrived there about 11 oclock, we somewhat surprised them but however we had a nice dinner and a pleasant time. We then started for Uncle Eliases Veatches about two miles (young Mr H B Barnes and his sister Elizabeth concluded to go with us that far in his sleigh) We got ready to start Mr H B Barnes invited me to ride with him and for Elizabeth to ride in my place in the sled. I accepted his invitation and we had a nice sleigh ride to my Uncles, we arrived there about dark. Uncle Daniel Shimms family were all there when we arrived there, and after we had been there awhile Mr. J Mcgee and Mr Jas Wiseman came in there were about 18 persons there besides my Uncles own family seven in number. There were 3 young gentlemen namely Mr H Barnes, Mr James Wiseman and John Mcgee ladies Miss E Barnes, Miss S. Veatch and myself. We all talked until supper we then eat and us young folks began to talk of taking a sleighride. Finally we concluded to do so there were two sleighs there, room in one for two couples and in the other for only one couple, Bonnets and shawls, Caps and comforter were soon on and all ready to start. Mr H Barnes was my partner, it is a beautiful night the moon and stars are shining brightly. We were soon sailing rapidly over the glittering snow flakes. We went past my cousins house. James Veatch and boys allowed to let them know that we would soon be back. We went on about 1 mile further and then cam back and stopped at James and stayed 1 hour and a falf, we then went back to my Uncles all well pleased with the evenings excursion. It was then after 9 we soon all dispersed and went to our homes. And tis this that another Christmas has been spent by me. Although the day I must confess might have been better spent but the day is gone and on such days young people will take leisure, so good bye now.
