Dear Members and Friends

Well, as you can see from the post mark date on your newsletter I am about 2 months late in getting this newsletter out. I just don't know how time gets away from a person. The Society ended the year with our annual meeting and election of officers in December. We have accomplished a few things and left a few more projects to be completed in 1998. One completed project was the sale of the reprint of the 1976 Davis County history book. We sold 36 books! We still have 14 left for sale, they are \$75.00. Just write the society if you are interested. Since so many people had purchased the book when it was published in 1976 without the index, we decided to sell the index to the book seperately. (see listing along with other Davis Co. materials elsewhere in newsletter.) The index was sent to Iowa Genealogy Society for printing and sales in October of 1997. The Society received their copy in January of 1998. This reprint of the history book and indexing the book was a project that we had been working on for acouple of years, so it felt good to finish it. Now on to other things.

Another project that seems to be about completed is the WPA Grave Registration and War Record Survey. This was orginially done in 1938 as a program directed by Adjutant General. The purpose of the project was "a survey to provide a complete file of the names, war records, and other information of the deceased veterans resting within the State of Iowa." (from Iowa Graves Registration & War Record Survey Manual of Instructions) Each county in the state had this project. Ours in Davis County has been a valuable tool in genealogy research. It is an alphabetical listing of people buried in Davis County cemeteries. It does not list children. The cemeteries were platted in 1973-76 but by that time many of the old stones were gone to unreadalbe. So you can see that the WPA listing was a good source for older burials. It will be through the work of many members that this project has been put on computer, proofread and finally sent to IGS for publishing. Our goal is to have it to IGS this summer so it will be available for sale to the public before State Convention in the fall.

Well my page has run out so I had better close for now. Happy Ancestor Hunting.

National Archives Alert

John H. Carlin, former Governor of Kansas and now the country's top archivist, is proposing a program to close all 12 of the regional archive locations. The regional offices are found in:

- 1. Waltham, MA holds records for states of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont.
- New York, NY holds records for New Jersey, New York, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- 3. Philadelphia holds records for Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia.
- 14. East Point, GA has records for Alabama; Florida, Georgia, Kentucky; Mississippi; North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee, we have transfered problems on all pensoes in pix.

- 5. Chicago, IL holds records for Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin.
- 6. Kansas City, MO has records for Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska.
- 7: Fort Worth, TX holds records for Arizona, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas.
- 8. Denver, CO holds records for Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming and some records created in New Mexico and Arizona.
- 9. Laguna Niguel, CA holds records for Arizona, southern 11 counties in California and Clark County, Nevada.
- 10. San Bruno, CA holds records for Northern California, Hawaii, Nevada (except for Clark County) and the American Samoa Islands.
- 11. Seattle, WA holds records for Idaho, Oregon and Washington.
- 12. Anchorage, AK holds records for Alaska.

Carlin proposes to build two mega-archives, perhaps in Washington, DC and in either California or Kansas. The plan calls for all of the microfilm in the present archives to be deposited in university libraries and public libraries - neither of which has the space nor the staff to accommodate the millions of researchers who use these regional archives. Presently the regional archives have trained, professional staff persons in place.

COLONIAL EXPRESSIONS STILL IN USE BY RICHARD BAUMAN

Some of the colorful everyday expressions we use have been around for more than 200 years. Many even predate the American Revolution. Phrases such as "sleep tight," "read between the lines," "beat to a pulp," "eat my hat," and "pulling the wool over his eyes" all originated in the 1770's.

When you tell someone to "sleep tight" you might think it means snuggle down under the blankets and keep warm. That's not what it originally meant. In colonial times, mattressses were suspended in bed frames by ropes. To sleep comfortable, it was necessary to tighten the ropes each night using a huge, key-line device. The saying referred to firming-up the matress ropes for a pleasant sleep.

"Beat to a pulp" and "read between the lines" were colonial expressions. One came from the paper-making process and the other from using paper. Rags were the main ingredient in paper 200 years ago. They were soaked in water, then broken down to minute fibers by beating with stone or iron implements. The result was a pulp used to make paper.

Paper was an expensive item in the 1700's, and a few sheets might cost a day's wages. When someone wrote a letter and had a lot to say, the person would write from top to bottom on the page, then turn it upside down and write between the lines going the other way. The recipient had to be able to "read between the lines" in order to get the full message.

Fashionable men wore wigs in colonial America. The wealthier a man was, the greater his importance and the larger his wig. A "bigwig" was (and is) an influential or important person. If someone grabbed a fellow's wig and pulled it down over his face so he couldn't see, he'd had "the wood pulled over his eyes."

A small out-of-the-way place is often called a "jerkwater town". The expression come from the early days of railroading when steam engines had to be refilled from water towers about every 50 miles. Larger towns had help to fill the boilers, but smaller and more remote areas didn't. The train fireman had to grab and jerk a rope to start the water flow, thus it was a "jerkwater town."

Two centuries ago, sugar was rare and expensive, and sold in small cone-shaped packages called "sugar hats", hence the expression, "I'll eat my hat."

Bootlegger was a household word of the 1920's and 30's, begun in the 1800's. Smugglers would hide liquor bottles in the high tops of their boots, so they were "bootleggers."

The nursery rhyme, "Hickory, dickory, dock" describes a commons event in colonial times. Clocks were oak gears weren't unusual. Animal fat was used to keep the wooden gears lubricated, but the scent attracted mice that would get inside and gnaw on the gears. To discourage the mice, most clocks had loud chimes or bells. When the clock would strike the hour or half-hour, mice inside were driven away by the noise.
