We could find no record on size of church but Frank Bowling, an older member of our church, remembers it as a frame building resembling a small country schoolhouse, built just east of the present building. A financial report found in quarterly conference book reads as follows: Bloomfield Circuit, Iowa Conference November 23, 1861.

Report of trustees August 25, 1866: We the trustees of Wesley Chapel beg leave to report through our chairman to the quarterly conference that we have paid up all arrearages against said church and we are now out of debt. A. K. Duckworth, Sect, Wm. Britton, Chairman.

June 1869 report on Wesley Chapel repairs one hundred dollars. Trustees: Lewis Rominger, James Hartup, Uriah Rominger, S. Smith, J. Smith, J. Sanderson, and D. Hill.

During ministry of J. W. Wright, 187601879, our older member, Frank Bowling, again tells us of hearing his father Lewis Bowling speak about people coming from miles around to hear Brother Wright preach the gospel. The church building was far too small to hold the large crowds. It was then a larger church building was planned and built, with the men in the neighborhood, including Mr. Bowling, hauling logs to sawmill then hauling the lumber to the site of the church building, and erecting the church. The Bible stand, altar railing, seats, were made by Lewis Rominger, Cornelius Barnett and William Gibson. It was their request that these articles always be left in the church. The main entrance was a vestibule at the west end and a single door on the ast near the southeast corner of building. The pulpit and altar were on the east toward the north. In 1890, under the ministry of P. G. Hogle, the pulpit was changed to the north side.

The library table, the three folding dining tables in basement were made and donated by Har King.

One altar chair was given at this time by Mr. & Mrs. Billy McMain in memory of his father Sammy McMain; Mrs. Fannie Hillman gave a chair in memory of her husband, Johnathan Hillman. The other chair was given by Aunt Belle Barnett in memory of her parents Mr. & Mrs. Summers Sensensey.

In 1910 a new pressure gasoline system was installed replacing the old kerosene lights. Coal stoves furnished the heat.

During the ministry of Rev. Slack in 1912, a cement block foundation was put under the building replacing the old wooden blocks.

In the fall of 1923 a basement was dug south of the church. The church was raised from the old foundation and moved south over the new basement. The vestibule was removed from the west to the south sid4e as it is today. Wes Tarrance was given the contract for the carpenter work. Ceilings were lowered, new floor laid and the new entrance stairway was built. A new furnace and Delco light plant was installed. Approximate cost \$5500.00. On November 9, 1924, the church was rededicated with Rev. U. S. Smith delivering the morning sermon and Rev. J. F. Barnett the afternoon sermon.

In 1941 the church was wired for electricity and hooked up to R.E.A. In 1942 a coat of paint was given the church by men in the community. In the spring of 1954, an oil furnace installed by Hutchings Appliance at a cost of \$1200. Part of the labor was donated, including donating a clock and installing same in basement, also installing the upstairs clock.

We go now to May, 1958. The church is being given a new paint job, inside and out. Outside paint was purchased through Wayne Harris at cost. Total amount \$111.63. Don Bullock and Ted Eaton doing inside painting and Mr. Jacobs the outside. The work not having been finished as we go to press, the total amount of cost is not known.

Wesley Chapel has contributed its share in providing men for the ministry. At the beginning of the church, men who wished to become local preachers, were examined by Exhorters of the church, their character passed upon and given a license to preach. These local preachers held meetings at local campgrounds with large attendance of people from the surrounding territory. Among these preachers from Wesley Chapel were: Wm. A. Fry, Corneilus Barnett, and Dempson Hill

Rev. Frank Barnett was ordained as a minister in 1880, ten years later Rev. U. S. Smith, Rev. H. C. Ethell, and Rev. James Senseney. Rev. Chas. King, Mason City, though never a member of Wesley Chapel, his parents and grandparents were active members in our church. Many here today will remember the teachings of his grandmother, Mrs. Wm. Grim, and the work done in this church by his grandfather, Charlie King.

Arthur Rankin, now a Methodist lay minister at Palo, IA. Arthur and Charles both attended Wesley Chapel in their boyhood.

We are proud of the Bohi Brothers, Philip and Bill, delivering the sermons today, who grew up attending Wesley Chapel church and who today with many more of us, are paying tribute to the one who made it possible by building a church called Wesley Chapel.

Sketch of Parsonage

Records show first parsonage for circuit built at Springville in early 1858. For different

reasons this site proved unsuitable and in December 1858 P. H. Bence proposed that he would take the parsonage and release the circuit from any liabilities for building same. Records show rent paid out at different times until 1890, when unde4r Rev. Shook a parsonage was acquired at West Grove. It remained there until 1924 when it was sold and one purchased in Bloomfield. This was later sold and one purchased in West Grove in 1952. Circuit is now West Grove—Wesley Chapel. Drakesville is also on the circuit.

CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION JUNE 29, 1958 WESLEY CHAPEL M.E. CHURCH

(This article is copied from a prepared program for the Wesley Chapel M.E. Church celebration. Wesley Chapel is located in Wycondah Township, Davis County Iowa.)

HISTORY OF WESLEY CHAPEL

The beginning of a church called Wesley Chapel reads as follows: Springville Circuit, Albia District: The second quarterly meeting held at Letner's schoolhouse March 1st, 1857, Brother Hammond P. E. committee composed of A.H. Duckworth, J. E. Ford and Cornelius Barnett, presented a report containing the estimate of building a church near Dempson Hill's to be called Wesley Chapel. Total amount of report \$1394.32. Report received and adopted. Building committee appointed, A. K. Duckworth, Wm. L. Millsap, and Lewis Rominger

The one acre of ground donated by Dempson Hill was just across the road west from the Wesley Chapel Cemetery in the Northeast corner of 40 acres now owned by Dale Dixon. The one acre for the cemetery was donated by Wm. Evans who then owned the land later owned by Charlie King and now owned by Truman Aleshire. For different reasons the church was not started at that time but deaths in the community made it necessary to use the one acre donated for the cemetery. The bodies of John H. and Margaret E., children of Jacob and Sarah Rush, had already been buried in January 1857. The recording the deed reads in part: April 6, 1857, for the consideration of \$.50 we, Wm Evans and Elizabeth Evans convey to Dempson Hill, James L. Rawlings and Benjamin W. Martin, trustees of the Wesley Chapel graveyard———.

The people became restless and somewhat divided on the church issue. The southern part of the community wanted the church built in Springville, which at that time was a small town a short distance northwest of the Sam Botts residence now occupied by Junior Botts. This locations would take the church away from the center of the community so the issue was decided by choosing a location farther north in order to draw people from a new neighborhood and not interfere with the church to the south. This explains why Wesley Chapel church and cemetery sites do not join. The site chosen then for the church is where it now stands. The deed for one acre of land was made April 28, 1858, by John H. and Emily A. Pry to Wm. L. Millsap, James Rawlings, John Pry, John E. Ford, Ivan S. Ford, Cornelius Barnett and A. K. Duckworth, trustees of the Wesley Chapel church for the sum of \$20.00.
