Though in his best years, Regenburg became the victim of illness, which treacherously pursued him and brought his life to an end. He want to Omaha last January and spent nine weeks in one of the hospitals, making every effort to regain his health. Since Easter so that he might have the care of the doctor here, he lived with his aunt, Mrs. U. A. Uden of George, where he received kind care and hospitality. A short time ago, he was taken to the Sibley hospital, his last effort to retain his life but he took his departure for the realms beyond on August 9, 1937. In all his suffering he was patient and thought not to burden his loved ones, with what he had to bear and endure. He was a kind and faithful husband and a loving father. He expressed his faith in Chris as his Savior and he preferred the Evangelical Church and requested to be buried from there. He leaves to mourn his death his wife, Alma, and daughter, Ellen Mae, of Currie, Minnesota, and one sister, Mrs. Jay Powers of Hastings, Nebraska, and other relatives and friends.

Members of the Lionel Boudreau Legion Post of Currie, Minnesota, were pallbears and a full military funeral with a firing squad from the post were in attendance. Burial was in Evergreen Lawn Cemetery in George, Iowa. (August 12, 1937).
