FLOYD H. CAMPBELL, 63

Floyd Hiram Campbell, son of Ray S. and Margaret Cissna Campbell, was born on a farm in Monroe township, on Dec. 28, 1910. He died at Bishop Clarkson hospital in Omaha, Nebr., on Jan. 25, 1974, after a year's illness, at age 63 years and 28 days. He drew to adulthood in Shelby county and graduated from Harlan high school. He attended Iowa State College in Ames, for two years. In 1934 he married Thelma C. Pulver. To this union four children were born. After their marriage, they farmed in Shelby county. In 1972 they moved into Walnut, after semi-retirement, but he continued to farm southeast of Walnut. For 10 years he was an instructor for "On The Farm Training" Veterans program. He was also affiliated with the Farm Bureau, the Pork Producer's, Beef Producer's, and in Extension Work. Floyd has been a member of the Methodist church since boyhood. He was presently lay leader at the Monroe Chapel Methodist church.

He was preceded in death by his parents. Survivors include his wife, Thelma; four children - Carolyn Mayne of Harlan; Richard of Loveland, Colo.; Jane (Mrs James Johnson) of Boulder, Colo; and Larry of Puerto Rico; by 11 grandchildren: Kathy, Greg, Jeffery, Peggy Jane, Cheri, Todd, Lori, Rick, Andrew, Wade and Robert; and by one sister - Janice (Mrs Ray Errett) of Papillion, Nebr.; by one uncle, Roy Campbell of Hancock; by two aunts - Mrs Jennie B. Sowel in California and Ruth (Mrs George Rickers) of Co. Bluffs; by one niece; three nephews and several cousins.

Funeral services were held on, Monday, Jan. 28, 1974 at the Pauley Home for Funerals in Harlan with Rev Larry LaVelle conducting the services, assisted by Rev. James Ford. Burial was in the Harlan cemetery with Jack Coe, Mark Smith, David Smith, Robert Koos, Charles Koos and Dennis Errett serving as pallbearers.
