

LIFE STORY OF—

NORMAN KRAMER, 23

Norman F. Kramer of Earling was born Feb. 10, 1942, the son of Marie and Carl Kramer at Earling. He died Oct. 5, 1965, as a result of an auto-truck accident at Jet. Highway 64 and 39 south of Portsmouth. He was 23 years, seven months and 25 days.

Kramer attended St. Joseph's school in Earling and was a member of Knights of Columbus, Earling Council no. 1741. At the time of his death, he was employed as a cutler at Farm Best Pork Plant, Denison. He had served with the Reserve and Iowa National Guard.
