Jeffery Glen Carl, son of Valentine Samuel and Orimal Woodhouse Carl was born July 6, 1936 at Harlan, and entered into rest Dec. 14, 1991 at Colonial Manor Nursing Home, Corning, at age 55 years, 5 months and 8 days. He attended school at Harlan, graduating in 1955. He enlisted immediately in the U.S. Air Force and served from 1955 until 1959.

April 23, 1960, he married Edna Ann Eilts at Walnut. Four sons were born to this union. Following his discharge, he worked as an electrician in Harlan, and as an air traffic controller for O'Hare Airport in Chicago, IL., before moving to IA in 1971, where he farmed in the Massena and Corning area the next ten years. He was very supportive of farm projects, working as a 4-H leader, Extension Council member and organizer of the V.A. Farmers School in Massena. He was a member of St. Patrick Catholic Church and always willing to help whenever needed. He was very active in the Knights of Columbus, serving in offices and as Grand Knight, and attaining the high rank of 4th Degree Knight in the organization. He also was a religious education teacher in the CCD program as long as his health permitted.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Edna Carl of Corning; his sons, Russell (Deb), Daniel (Karen), Matthew and Kent; three grandchildren; three brothers, Doug (Mary) of Waterloo; Nick (Ann) of Marshalltown; and Marc (Marcie) of Harlan; four sisters, Lois Dean (David) of Omaha, NE.; Carolyn Schwery (Jim) of Panama; Roxanne Nevel (Wayne) of Harlan; and Vickie Johannsen (Alan) of Mitchellville; many nieces and nephews and other relatives.

Funeral services were held Dec. 16, 1991 at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Corning with Fr. John Bertogli, officiating. Burial was in the Calvary cemetery in Corning.
