

Clarence E. Wohlhutter, 83

Nov. 25, 1908 — Dec. 31, 1991

KIRKMAN — Clarence Edwin Wohlhutter, son of Emilie Ethlyn Conrad and Albert Wohlhutter was born on a farm west of Harlan, Nov. 25, 1908. He attended country schools near Harlan through the 8th grade and later helped his parents farm. In 1923, he moved with his family to a farm just west of Corley, where he grew to adulthood.

He married Edna Croft Sept. 2, 1931 at the First Lutheran Church in Omaha, NE. One son, Bernard, was born to this union. After their marriage, they lived for several years in Corley, before moving to a farm east of Kirkman in 1940. They shared farming operations here for 15 years before moving to the Rabbitt Hollow area east of Harlan. They continued to farm there until 1969. They then farmed east of Kirkman for three years before moving to Walnut. They lived at Walnut until Dec. of 1986, when they moved to Harlan. Before Edna's death Sept. 28, 1988, they celebrated 57 years of marriage. After her death, he continued to live in Harlan until Nov. of 1989, when he became a resident of the Salem Lutheran Home in Elk Horn. He died at Myrtue Memorial Hospital in Harlan, Dec. 31, 1991, just one month and 6 days past his 83rd birthday.

His only child, Bernard preceded him in death Dec. 16, 1982, as well as his mother in 1968 and his father in 1961. Survivors include three grandchildren; three-great-grandchildren; one brother, Leonard of Harlan; daughter-in-law, Dolores Wohlhutter of Harlan; nieces and nephews and other relatives.

Funeral services were held Jan. 3, 1992, at the Pauley Funeral Home with Pastor Walter Bernard of the Kirkman United Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Rose Hill cemetery at Kirkman with E.J. Conrad and Kenneth Conrad honorary casketbearers.
