I am, as you know, a cook. I have been a cook during all my army life. I have 5 cooks working for me. At the present time, we are feeding over 1,200 people in our Mess Hall. We have 3 other mess halls here on the post. I don't know for sure but I think we are feeding well over 4,000 people. Tune in some Saturday afternoon and listen to our radio program, "This is Halloran," at 3:00 to 3:30 over WOR, New York. I am sending you a picture of Ralph Hanson and myself. Ralph and I get together every time he comes back to the states."

Cpl. William R. Jones, Portsmouth, N. H., "You might pass the word on to the boys who would like to get a "nice soft job doing guard duty somewhere" (I said it myself once) that there is no such thing. States side posts are short handed, that is, Marine Corps posts. So every man must do about twice as much as we did in peace time."

Cp. Wayne O. Smith, Fort Jackson, South Carolina, "We're stationed here in Fort Jackson doing practically nothing. The 87th has a year of very tough training behind it, and the 18 and 19 year old kinds that started out with us a year ago are now rather a rugged bunch. Even the commanding general says the outfit is ready for overseas duty. My area takes in the occupied portion of Italy and the islands of Sicily, Sardinia and Corsica. I try to get around to call on my chaplains once a month so it means that I am on the road or should I say "in the air" a good part of the time. During the month of February I was in the office only ten of the twenty-nine days. I am not so keen about flying but I do enjoy the work and getting around like I do I see a lot of country and that helps to remove the monotony that might be connected with this kind of work. The first of March I was given some encouragement in the work by being promoted to the rank of Major. Yesterday morning before returning from a trip to the other side of Italy I went to the Red Cross club with the air force chaplain and there met Miss Dolliver. I did not know that she had been transferred from "our town." I did meet her at the Red Cross Headquarters here in January. She is very busy getting a splendid club going in the place she is in now. It is one of the best set-ups I have seen for a Red Cross Club. I am sharing my copies of the letter with Lt. Col. Matthew Thompson, who is attached to our headquarters. He used to live in Fort Dodge, he tells me, and he finds many familiar names in the letter. In all the time that I have been overseas I have met only one Webster County soldier and he was a Gowrie boy."
