THE WAR ON THE HOME FRONT. On Tuesday morning, Commander-in-Chief Robert Blue (Governor to you) ordered Company G to the battle of Eldora. On Wednesday of last week as YLFH previously reported, 179 boys rioted in the mess hall, went out the windows and over the hill. Next day, nine more left and then after four companies of the state guard arrived, 40 more and then after four companies of the state guard arrived, 40 more made their escape. Von Krog, superintendent, was suspended; two employees were held to the grand jury. Ronald Miller, 17, was killed by a blow on the head. That was the immediate cause of the riot. But old and savage punishments had created the spirit of rebellion. With those who went over the hill to escape the beatings with ax handles and leather hammer straps were Kenneth Worrick and Frank Grell, Jr., Fort Dodge boy bandits recently sent to Eldora. Some miles away from the school, Worrick was shot twice, once with a shot gun and again with a twenty-two by two different farmers. He is now back in the hospital at Eldora.... Company G left here with 31 men under the command of Company G left here with 31 men under the command of Lt. Leonard Pint. Several high school boys are with the company ... Several investigations are going on at Eldora. Percy Lainson, warden at Fort Madison, has been named temporary superintendent. He and Lt. Col. Moss of the State Guard have already made ent. He and Lt. Col. Moss of the State Guard have already made some changes, better meals, better beds, better living conditions. Some 570 boys were getting only 100 pints of milk a day—many of these youngsters are only 10 and 12 years old. The real story of the shame and disgrace of Eldora is to be found in the refusal of the Iowa legislature year after year to appropriate enough money to make these places run right. I know. I was in the Senate.

The same thing is true of our insane hospitals. Only worse . . . A movement is on foot to get the Governor to appoint Fred Cooper, Fort Dodge high school athletic director, superintendent of Eldora. If you want to help, write to Governor Robert Blue in Des Moines .
